House Bill 673 also known as the "Hands Free Law" was passed by the Georgia General Assembly and signed into law by Governor Nathan Deal. The Hands Free Law took effect on July 1, 2018. The Hands-Free law in Georgia prohibits the following:

- Reading, writing or sending text messages or emails
- Taking photos or recording videos
- Using the Internet
- Posting on a social media
- Holding a phone in your hand or another part of your body

The use of cellphones will be allowed only when making emergency calls to report a traffic crash, criminal activity, fire, medical emergency or hazardous road conditions. Drivers will also be allowed to text if they are using technology that converts voice to text messages. Holding a phone at all while driving is prohibited; even when stopped for a traffic signal or stop sign.

According to the 2022 Georgia Distracted Driving Observational Survey, 16.8% of all drivers were observed to have some form of distraction while operating a motor vehicle. This suggests that at any point in time or location on Georgia roadways, at least 1 out of 6 drivers may be distracted.

Texting is one of the most alarming distractions while driving. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed. Let's prioritize safety on the road and commit to keeping our focus where it belongs: on safe driving



- 54 percent of all motor vehicle traffic crashes had at least one confirmed or suspected distracted driver.
- 29 percent of all serious injury crashes involved at least one driver confirmed or suspected of distraction.
- According to the 2022 Georgia Distracted Driving Observational Survey, 16.8percent of all drivers were observed to have some form of distraction (i.e., talking, texting, dialing, or eating).
- 75 percent of all distraction related crashes involved at least one other vehicle besides the distracted driver.
- Since the Hands-Free Law took effect, the number of distracted driving convictions processed by the Department of Driver Services continues to increase.
- Drivers aged 15-to-24 years had the highest proportion of drivers involved in distraction related motor vehicle crashes and received more distracted driving citations after a crash compared to any other age group.
